

# Link to a Google Doc Tab or Section

You can group your Google doc content by [tab](#) or [heading style](#) to make it easy for others to find the information they need.

## URL Tags

A URL tag<sup>?</sup> is a unique set of characters that identify where content is located in a Google document. When included in a hyperlink, URL tags guide users directly to the tagged content. Google doc URLs use these tag formats:

Tab: `?tab=t.lr37dgou7yox`

Heading Style: `#heading=h.c00419qmfkw7`

Bookmark: `#bookmark=id.7oauh7h0zvil`

## Link to a Section on the Same Tab

1. Click in the document where you want the link, or select the text you want to link.
2. Click **Insert link > Headings and bookmarks**.
3. Select the heading you want to hyperlink to.

## Link to Another Tab in the Same Document

1. At the top left of the document, click **Show tabs and outlines**.
2. Click the tab that you want to share.
3. Click **Tab options > Copy**.
4. Click the tab where you want to insert the hyperlink.
5. Click in the document where you want the link, or select the text you want to link.
6. Click **Insert link**.
7. Right-click in the **Search or paste a link** field > **Paste**.
8. Click **Apply**.

## Link to a Section on Another Tab in the Same Document

1. At the top left of the document, click **Show tabs and outlines**.
2. Click the tab that has the section you want to share.
3. Click in header text for the section you want to share.
4. Right-click the text > **Copy heading link**.
5. Click the tab where you want to insert the hyperlink.
6. Click in the document where you want the link, or select the text you want to link.
7. Click **Insert link**.
8. Right-click in the **Search or paste a link** field > **Paste**.
9. Click **Apply**.

## Troubleshooting

**Q:** I created a link to a section on another tab. When I click the link, the doc moves to the correct tab, but doesn't scroll to the correct section. It just stays at the top of that tab.

**A:** The section title might not have its own URL tag. Try formatting the section title with a [heading style](#) first and then [link to that section](#).

**Technical Note:** Google uses several terms to link users to a specific part of a Google document. From a technical perspective, all these types are basic [URL bookmarks](#). To reduce name confusion when explaining this concept, I use the term *URL tag* to describe `?tab=`, `#heading=`, and `#bookmark=id`.
